
MAPW has had a dynamic year again, with many activities to shed a light on some of the forces that profit from, promote and prolong armed violence in our world.

### **ACTIONS FOR PEACE**

#### **Nuclear weapons abolition**

- Regular talks and published letters, articles and news items Australia-wide
- Successful advocacy for health professionals, professional colleges and organisations to endorse the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons
- Awarded \$10 000 from the Jessie Street Trust to develop and launch the Quit Nukes nuclear weapon divestment campaign

### Militarism, especially the impact of weapons companies

- Founding member of the Australian Arms Control Coalition, a group including Save the Children, Oxfam Australia, Human Rights Watch Australia, and the Australian Centre for International Justice. The Coalition advocates for better controls of Australian arms exports and cessation of exports to the Saudi-led coalition bombing Yemen, generating media coverage and political attention
- Australia: Stop Arms Promotion (ASAP) project generated media and public attention to the Australian War Memorial's commercial partnerships with war profiteers, Melbourne University's collaboration with Lockheed Martin, and the Avalon arms fair
- Intern Lisa Coulthard produced original research on the intrusion of weapons companies into STEM education in schools

#### War and insecurity

- Media and public commentary in opposition to US hostilities towards Iran, and Australian involvement with military action in the Strait of Hormuz
- Engagement with Australian government about humanitarian consequences of the war in Yemen and Australia's role in arming Saudi-led coalition
- Engagement with parliamentarians on LAWS (lethal autonomous weapons systems, or killer robots)
- Engagement with the Indian and Pakistani High Commissions about the crisis in Kashmir
- Launched a collaboration with the History Teachers Association of Victoria, a project on the long term impacts of World War 1
- Developed and launched an interactive guide to Alice Springs' local World War 1 stories
- Engagement with Foreign Minister on violence and suppression in **West Papua**
- Local actions for peace in South Australia, Western Australia, and Tasmania

#### Nuclear power and nuclear waste

- Submissions and testimony to parliamentary inquiries in response to renewed calls for nuclear power in Australia
- Ongoing advocacy against plans for nuclear waste dumping, and engagement with affected communities

#### Climate

 Advocacy on the link between conflict and climate crisis, participation in local and national actions, endorsement of climate campaigns

#### Refugees

 Advocacy in support of the Medevac Bill to allow refugees to receive appropriate health care

#### Whistle-blowers

 Public and media commentary in support of whistleblowers, such as David McBride who exposed unlawful activities of Australia's elite special forces in Afghanistan

#### **Peace Research**

 Submission to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Research Classification Review 2019 to advocate that peace studies be recognised in academic codes as a distinct discipline

The **Quit Nukes** campaign launched during 2019 Disarmament Week.

Quit Nukes asks Australian superannuation funds to divest completely, across all portfolios, from companies that produce, or support the production or deployment of, nuclear weapons.

Divestment is an integral part of progress towards the total **abolition** of nuclear weapons.

Divestment stigmatises nuclear weapons, and creates new norms and standards for financial institutions.


Divestment is consistent with principles of responsible investment, and with community expectations about ethical investment: our research found 69% of Australians did not want their superannuation invested in nuclear weapons companies.

Quit Nukes is an initiative of MAPW in collaboration with the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, Australia.

Quit Nukes gratefully acknowledges the support of the **Jessie Street Trust**. The Trust continues the work of Jessie Street (1889 - 1970), a committed advocate for equal rights and justice for all, elimination of all forms of discrimination, and world peace and disarmament.




### **MEMBERS & DONORS**

MAPW partnered with the History Teacher's Association of Victoria (HTAV) to produce After Armistice, an educational resource on the enduring effects of World War 1.

After Armistice addresses the long and short term health effects of WW1. MAPW worked closely with HTAV to develop a compelling resource aligned to the Victorian curriculum. We thank Jo Clyne (HTAV), Peter O'Rourke (John Fawkner Secondary College), and Peter Khalil, (Federal Member for Wills) for their collaboration.



MAPW provides campaign assistance and in-kind support to the Australian Campaign to Stop Killer Robots.

Lethal Autonomous Weapons Systems - 'Killer Robots' - are Al-powered weapons that can kill without meaningful human control. The UN has appealed for a ban on these weapons, and dozens of countries around the world have expressed concern.

We support the campaign's efforts to secure a preemptive ban on these weapons. MAPW lends its voice and expertise to the campaign and provides office space in our National HQ.




MAPW founded ICAN in 2007, and continues to provide expertise to this global campaign.

The humanitarian argument for a nuclear ban is at the core of our work for nuclear abolition. In 2018-2019 we brought more health professionals and health organisations into the campaign for the UN nuclear ban treaty, supported the Cities Appeal through our nuclear divestment work, and represented ICAN at events across Australia.
